



Free Congregational Church 16 Lincklaen Street Cazenovia, NY

Built: 1838

Style: Classical Revival with Greek Revival Tower

Federal Style detailing of cornice, fan light with Greek

Revival style tower, transitional

Architect: Unknown

Construction Type: Timber Frame

Notable Features: Steeple, Exterior Detailing, front steps

Alterations: 1854, Purchased by Village (or Town?), renovated for

public hall and offices with stage seating for 500

1886 ,renovated, enlarged as Cazenovia Hall (Casa Nova)

1895, Burned

Existing: 1897 Cazenovia Theatre

Renovated by Cazenovia College in 1990s as Catherine

Cummings Theatre

Organized: As part of Cortland Circuit in 1816

Incorporated 1830; First Society, Methodist Episcopal

Church in Cazenovia

Built: First Church 1833, Meeting House

Style: Federal with Gothic Revival Detailing Construction Type: Stone Masonry with Stone trim

Construction Type: Stone Masonry with Stone trim
Notable Features: Steeple, Pointed Windows, Oval gable window, and

Pointed windows & Doorways

Clock Built by Austin Van Ripper (Caz Steeple clock

maker) installed about 1850

Style: American Gothic Revival Architect: Unknown

Construction Type: Frame clapboard siding

Notable Features: Octagonal Steeple, Shouldered window and doorway hoods, broached spire, brackets, tower buttresses

Remodeled, for commercial use & Roller Rink Remodeled for apartments, steeple & windows & Alterations:

post WWII - storefronts removed

Existing: 1853 building as renovated for apartments, tower removed,

windows removed.

Village Baptist Church Missio Church 7 Seminary Street Cazenovia, NY

Organized: 1803 (2 miles south of Cazenovia until 1813)

(Severance says 1802 log meeting house 18'x 24 then Frame house thirty feet square, then 1817 bldg)

1813 -1817 Services held in Court House

Built: First Building 1817 Meeting House

Style: Federal
Construction Type: Timber Frame

Notable Features: Steeple and Exterior Detailing Alterations: Extensively repaired in 1835 and 1868

Demolished: Burned 1871
Built: Second Building 1880 (15,200.00)
Architect: Archimedes Russell

1790's Meeting House / School NW Corner of Sullivan St. & Emory Ave. Cazenovia, NY

Built:

1790s

Style: Late Georgian style Meeting House (26' x26' square)

Used for most community gatherings

Architect: Unknown

Construction Type: Timber Frame

Notable Features: Cupola, Hipped Roof & Details

Alterations: Remodeled, for commercial use about 1815

Removed by 1850s

Existing: 1880s House on site

Style: Architect: Phillip Hooker (\$10)

Construction Type: Timber Frame

Notable Features: Steeple, Exterior Detailing, Doorways & Interior

Moved: 1826 to Albany Street Alterations: Extensively repaired in 1834 Remodeled, 1866?? Exterior, Italianate Style

Interior, Sanctuary Refurbished in Italianate Style



































































So, What Do We Know?
